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NEIGHBORHOOD SNAPSHOT

TOP EXPERIENCES

- Fine Dining: Enjoy a meal in one of Prague's top-drawer restaurants, such as Vinohrady's Equilibrista or Vršovice's Benjamin.
- St. Wenceslas Church: Stroll around this weird and wonderful 20th-century church, with its sky-high clock tower visible from far and wide.
- Craft Beer: Set off on an epic pub crawl around the countless craft beer bars and microbreweries in this part of town.
- Indie Boutiques: Shop for boho vintage clothes and designer accessories in a host of small, independent boutiques.
- Slavia Prague: Watch one of the country's most famous soccer teams in full flow during a game at the Sinobo Stadium

GETTING HERE

Metro Line A bisects Vinohrady, so most sights are within easy reach of three stations: Náměstí Míru, Jiřího z Poděbrad, and Flora, Vršovice does not have any Metro stations, but Tram 22 offers a direct connection to Nové Město (New Town). Malá Strana (Lesser Quarter), and Prague Castle. There is limited (mostly paid) parking available in both neighborhoods.

PLANNING YOUR TIME

As they are mainly residential, Vinohrady and Vršovice make for pleasant, quiet neighborhoods to visit during weekdays. But if you want to make the most of the restaurants and nightlife—and meet some locals—come during evenings and weekends.

Dotted with pretty green parks, charming turn-of-the-20th-century houses, and some of Prague's best cafés and restaurants, Vinohrady and Vršovice are two of Prague's most appealing—yet mercifully crowd-free—neighborhoods.

Vinohrady is centered on Vinohradská, the main street that extends eastward from the top of Václavské náměstí (Wenceslas Square) to a belt of enormous cemeteries. Named for the vineyards that once dominated the area, it retains an air of upper crustiness thanks to its splendid 19th-century apartment buildings, pleasant tree-lined streets, and handsome church- and market-filled squares, as well as its extraordinarily high concentration of upmarket cafés and restaurants. Vinohrady also boasts two of Prague's most popular green spaces: the English garden-style Riegrovy sady (Rieger Park) and the Italian Renaissance-style Havlíčkovy sady (Havlíček Gardens).

Neighboring Vršovice, to the south and east of Vinohrady, is equally charming, if a little rougher around the edges. Its art nouveau town houses may be a little more faded and its hip coffee shops less frequent, but its incredible choice of bars (from craft beer hangouts to down-toearth hospody, or traditional Czech pubs), its quirky modernist churches, and its buzzing atmosphere during Slavia Prague match days more than make up for it.

Vinohrady



Havlíčkovy sady (Havlíček Gardens) NATIONAL/STATE PARK | Arguably Prague's prettiest park, Havlíček Gardens is best known for its Italian-style grotto and its rows of verdant vineyards. But the park also manages to pack in plenty of other attractions, from placid lakes to cascading fountains, and expansive green lawns to narrow woodland trails. It also has two excellent drinking and dining options: the charming garden café Pavilon Grébovka and the hilltop gazebo wine bar Viniční Altán. The latter also offers stunning views of the surrounding area. Kostel Nejsvětějšího Srdce Páně (Church of the Most Sacred Heart) RELIGIOUS SITE | If you've had your fill of Romanesque, Gothic, and baroque, this church offers a startlingly modernist alternative. Designed in 1927 by Slovenian architect Josip Plečnik (the same architect commissioned to update Prague Castle), the art deco edifice of this church—topped by a tower with an enormous glazed clock—resembles



a luxury ocean liner more than a place of worship. The effect was purposeful, as during the 1920s and 1930s the avant-garde imitated mammoth objects of modern technology. The interior decor is equally striking, particularly the altar, overlooked by a 10-foot-high gilded figure of Christ, flanked by six Czech patron saints. It's hard to miss the structure, which looms as you exit the Metro.

■TIP→While the front door (with a view

Nový židovský hřbitov (New Jewish Cemetery)

CEMETERY | In this, the newest of the city's half-dozen Jewish burial grounds, you can find the modest tombstone of Franz Kafka, which seems grossly inadequate to Kafka's fame but oddly in proportion to his own modest sense of self. The cemetery is usually open, although guards sometimes inexplicably seal off the grounds. Men may be required to wear a varmulke (you can buy one here if you need to). Turn right at the main cemetery gate and follow the wall for about 100 yards. Kafka's thin white tombstone lies at the front of section 21. City maps may label the cemetery "Židovské hřbitovy." 🖂 Izraelská 712/1, Vinohrady Free M Line A: Želivského.

Restaurants

Vinohrady is home to many of the capital's best restaurants. The neighborhood has two main dining hubs: the area surrounding Náměstí Miru, particularly south along Americká ulice; and the streets around the Metro station Jiřího z Poděbrad. However, you'll find some of the very finest dining experiences tucked away on less well-trodden avenues. For tasty, down-to-earth Czech food, you're better off heading to a pub.

* Aromi

\$\$\$ | ITALIAN | Gracious, gregarious, and extremely confident, Aromi is easily among the top tier of Italian restaurants in the city and proud of it. Classic pastas made in-house and fresh seafood shown off tableside are two of the crowd favorites, as are the superb salads and well-chosen Italian wines. Known for: sumptuous seafood dishes; faultless service; cooking courses available.

Blue Wagon

\$\$ | FRENCH | Open since 2012 and still going strong, this appealing Vinohrady restaurant serves up innovative. high-quality cuisine in a business-casual setting of blond woods, white walls, and inoffensive artworks. Bruxx

\$\$ | BELGIAN | Czech beer is facing increasing competition these days as younger Praguers set out to forge new traditions. Belgian ales, often tinged with fruit or nut flavors, served alongside kettles of mussels and golden frites with mayo sauce, are winning over not just locals but an upscale international clientele. Known for: Belgian beers on draught; fine fish and seafood dishes; outdoor seating in summer.

Dish

\$\$ | BURGER | One of Prague's best burger joints, Dish has a menu of 11 burgers, including the house "Dish" burger with bacon and cheddar cheese, a pulled duck confit burger with red cabbage, and a veggie-friendly portobello mushroom burger with smoked mozzarella and spinach. The interior is warm, with exposedbrick walls, and an appealing terrace blossoms in mild weather. \$\$\$ | ITALIAN | Simply put, you won't find a better Italian restaurant and wine bar in Prague. Owners Simona and Eric spent 20 years living in Italy and have brought their passion for—and expertise of—the local cuisine to the Czech capital. Known for: sumptuous thick-cut tenderloin carpaccio; sophisticated but unconceited ambience; fresh burrata (Italian cow milk cheese).

\$\$ | BURGER | A hopping burger bar on the fringe of Riegrovy Park in Vinohrady, the Tavern arguably serves the city's best hamburgers and cheeseburgers. The restaurant began as the dream of an American couple to use classic U.S. combinations, like bacon-cheddar or blue cheese and caramelized onion, and then re-create them with locally sourced beef and toppings. Known for: the city's best burgers; intimate cellar setting; extensive cocktail menu.

BREWPUBS/BEER GARDENS | This popular craft beer bar serves uncommon brews from the Czech Republic, across Europe, and the United States. It has an impressive 32 taps, with the choice of beers changing daily (though usually including at least one from its in-house Sibeeria Brewery label). There's also a good selection of beer snacks; opt for the excellent chicken wings. BREWPUBS/BEER GARDENS | This popular Vinohrady hangout brews a range of traditional and well-regarded Czech pilsners, including unpasteurized and unfiltered versions, as well as increasing number of IPAs and other ales. Retro Music Hall

DANCE CLUBS | With its location just a bit out of the center, this fun club provides an escape from the hassle of downtown. The street-level part is a pleasant functionalist-style café with outdoor seating, and the lower level houses a club with a big dance floor. The name is a bit misleading; there are some '80s nights, but the bulk of the schedule is hip-hop and other more contemporary sounds.

DANCE CLUBS | It claims to be the largest gay club in the Czech Republic, and with three floors that's probably right. There's a disco, multiple bars, seating areas with Wi-Fi, and other attractions for a male crowd. It's open only on Friday and Saturday night, but the party continues right through til 6 am. 
Kostel sv. Václava (St. Wenceslas Church) **RELIGIOUS SITE** | It's hard to miss this church—a striking constructivist work of art that, at 164 feet high, dominates the Vršovice skyline. Built in 1930 to commemorate 1,000 years since the death of St. Wenceslas, the building's most striking feature is its skyscraping white clock tower, topped by a 23-foothigh gold cross. It's worth a visit to see the exterior alone (and the lovely surrounding park), but for a peek inside, doors are usually open between 8 and 1 on Sunday for services. \$\$\$\$ | CZECH | Opened in 2017, Benjamin quickly gained—and has retained—a reputation as one of Prague's most sought-after fine-dining experiences.

Bad Flash

BREWPUBS/BEER GARDENS | One of Prague's best craft beer bars, Bad Flash has 12 taps serving a constant rotation of brews from its own stable as well as other Czech and international microbreweries. The minimalist, shabby-chic interior and simple menu of beer snacks (try the pickled cheese) attract a young and cosmopolitan crowd. The bar doesn't take reservations, so it's best to come early and stay late.

Sinobo Stadium

SOCCER | Home to Slavia Prague, one of the country's "big two" soccer teams along with Sparta Prague, the 21.000-seater Sinobo Stadium shows Slavia games throughout the season (July to May). There are league matches every other weekend, as well as occasional midweek European fixtures. Outside of home games, you can find out more about the club (and Czech football in general) at the stadium's Slavia Museum.
